POPE FRANCIS OPENS THE HOLY DOOR TO INAUGURATE THE “JUBILEE OF HOPE”

Pope Francis opened the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on Christmas Eve, December 24, 2024, to launch a "Jubilee Year of Hope."

The event began with the bells of the basilica pealing. After reading a passage from the Gospel of John, Pope Francis briefly left the atrium. He returned three minutes later, and aides slowly opened the door, which had been framed in a garland of green pine branches decorated with red roses and gold pinecones.

Opening the Holy Door has been a fixture of the Catholic Church's celebration of jubilee years since the Holy Year 1450. Pope Francis chose “Pilgrims of Hope” as the theme for the Holy Year 2025, which began Dec. 24 and will run through Jan. 6, 2026. The rite of opening the decorated bronze door began inside the basilica with the reading in different languages of biblical passages prophesying the birth of the saviour “who brings his kingdom of peace into our world.”

The Gospel of St. Matthew's account of the birth of Jesus was proclaimed to emphasise how the birth of Jesus “proclaims the dawn of hope in our world.” The choir sang, “Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord,” and the pope told the assembled cardinals, bishops, ecumenical guests, and lay faithful that they are the steps of the whole church, a pilgrim in the world and a witness of peace.

The Holy Door, typically sealed with bricks, sym-

bolises the barrier of sin between people and

God. The 16 panels on the bronze doors illustrate key moments in salvation history, including the fall of Adam and Eve, the annunciation of Jesus' birth, Christ's presentation as the shepherd rescuing a lost sheep, the crucifixion, and the risen Jesus' appearance to the disciples.

The Vatican and Jubilee press offices have not disclosed the pilgrims' names or selection process. The ritual, which marks the 1,700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, is a manifestation of the faith that all Christians share in Jesus, the Eternal Word made man. However, the Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity emphasised that the ecumenical guests' participation should not be interpreted as an attempt to associate them with elements of the jubilee, such as indulgence, which are not in line with their respective communities' practices.

The Catholic Church believes Christ and the saints have accumulated a treasure of merits that other believers can draw upon to reduce or erase punishment for sins. The Holy Year includes making a pilgrimage, going to confession, receiving Communion, and offering prayers to obtain indulgences.





HYDRATION MYTHS AND FACTS: ARE YOU DRINKING ENOUGH WATER?

Myth 2: Coffee and Tea Dehydrate You

Caffeine does have a mild diuretic effect, but this does not mean your morning coffee or tea is counterproductive. These drinks still contain water, which contributes to your overall hydration. Moderation is key – so enjoy your brew without fear.

Myth 3: Clear Urine Equals Perfect Hydration; You Cannot Overhydrate

Many believe that clear urine is the gold standard for hydration. While urine colour can indicate hydration status, aiming for completely clear urine may lead to overhydration. In fact, pale yellow urine is a healthy sign of proper hydration.

Drinking too much water can lead to hyponatremia, a dangerous condition in which sodium levels in the blood drop too low.

Are You Drinking Enough?

Rather than fixating on a magic number, tune into your body:

- Pay attention to thirst: It is your body's natural signal.
- Include water-rich foods: Cucumbers, watermelon, and oranges are great options.
- Increase water intake in hot weather, during exercise, or when unwell.
- Monitor urine colour: Pale yellow (amber colour) is ideal.

Hydration is not one-size-fits-all. You can maintain optimal hydration and health by debunking myths and understanding your body's needs.

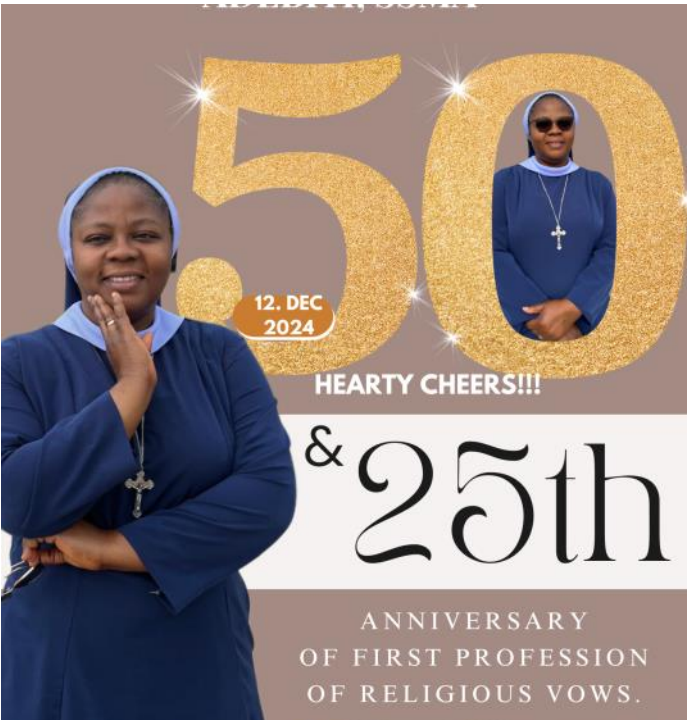

DEPRESSION AND ITS HIDDEN DANGER AMONG NIGERIAN YOUTH



Depression is a growing problem affecting millions of young people in Nigeria today. It silently takes hold of their lives, bringing emotional pain, mental struggles, and even physical health challenges. Unfortunately, many young people do not recognise it or are too abashed to speak out, leaving them to suffer in silence. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), over 280 million people worldwide live with depression, leading to over 700,000 suicides annually. This reality is becoming more evident among Nigerian youth as economic hardship, unemployment, and societal pressure take their toll.

Depression is called a **"silent killer"** for several reasons, some of them are:

1. **Unrecognised Symptoms:** Many young Nigerians mistake the signs of depression—such as constant sadness, lack of motivation, and loss of interest in life—for laziness, mood swings, or weakness. Without proper understanding, they don't seek help.

2. **Stigma:** Mental health issues are often taboo in Nigeria. Fear of being labelled as "weak" or "crazy" discourages many from speaking out or seeking treatment.

3. **High Suicide Rates:** Depression is a leading cause of suicide, and many cases go unnoticed until it's too late. The hidden battles young people face often result in tragic outcomes.



4. **Physical Health Risks:** Depression doesn't just affect the mind—it weakens the

body too. It can worsen illnesses like heart disease, diabetes, and other chronic conditions, silently damaging health.

Addressing depression requires a collective effort, such as:

1. **Awareness and Education:** Create programs

that teach young people to recognise the signs of depression and encourage open conversations about mental health. This will help reduce stigma.

2. **Affordable Mental Health Services:** Mental health care should be easily accessible and affordable for all. Free or subsidised therapy, counselling, and support groups can make a huge difference.

3. **Community Support:** Parents, teachers, and community leaders must be involved. Encouraging open dialogue and showing empathy can help struggling youths feel seen and supported.

4. **Self-Care:** Promote healthy lifestyles, including exercise, proper sleep, and mindfulness activities like prayer or meditation. These simple steps can improve mental well-being.

5. **Government Action:** Policies must prioritise mental health awareness and include mental health education in schools and workplaces.

Depression is a hidden crisis silently affecting Nigerian youth, but it does not have to remain this way. By breaking the silence, raising awareness, and providing the proper support, lives can be saved and hope restored. Now more than ever, we must act to ensure that young people get the help they need. Silence can no longer be an option. The time for change is now!

CALENDAR OF EVENTS FOR JUBILEE 2025: THE HOLY YEAR OF HOPE

"In this holy time, let us be touched by the transforming power of God's grace. It will be a journey of conversion and a joyful celebration of His infinite love" (Pope Francis).

Jubilee year is a time of grace and spiritual renewal for the entire ecclesial community. This extraordinary event began with the opening of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024. In his 'bull of indiction' **Spes non confundit**, Pope Francis invited the faithful to experience this Holy Year as "a special occasion of personal renewal and spiritual enrichment, in union with the whole Church." The Holy Door symbolises the pilgrimage of every believer. Pope Francis emphasised, "Passing through it reminds us that we are all on a journey, called to a deeper relationship with the Lord and openness to His grace, capable of transforming our lives and the world."

After the opening at St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, the Holy Door at Rebibbia Prison was opened on December 26. Subsequently, the Holy Door at the Basilica of St. John Lateran will open on December 29, 2024, followed by the Holy Door at St. Mary Major on January 1, 2025, and St. Paul Outside the Walls on January 5, 2025. These openings will mark the start of a global spiritual journey.

The Jubilee's events reflect the Church's diversity and richness. From January 24 to 26, 2025, the Jubilee of Communication will explore the media's role in fostering dialogue and peace. Special moments will be held in February for Artists and Armed Forces, while March will highlight Volunteers and the Missionaries of Mercy, focusing on divine mercy.

The month of April will centre on Healthcare, Youth, and People with Disabilities, emphasising inclusion and hope while Families, Children, and Grandparents, will be celebrated in May, highlighting the importance of passing faith across generations.

The Digital Missionaries and Catholic Influencers will gather on July 28 and 29, followed by a large youth event from July 28 to August 3. The Jubilee of Consolation will be

celebrated on September 15, followed by the Jubilee of Justice Operators on September 20 and a Catechists' meeting from September 26 to 28.

October will feature events for the Missionary World and Migrants on October 4 and 5, Consecrated Life on October 8 and 9, and Marian Spirituality on October 11 and 12. The World of Education will be the focus from October 31 to November 2. November will offer significant spiritual moments, including the Jubilee of the Poor on November 16 and the Jubilee of Choirs and Chorales on November 22 and 23.

The year will close symbolically on December 14 2025 with a celebration dedicated to Prisoners, underscoring the redemptive power of divine mercy.

In conclusion, the Jubilee of 2025 promises to be a period of reconciliation and renewal, inviting everyone to redis-

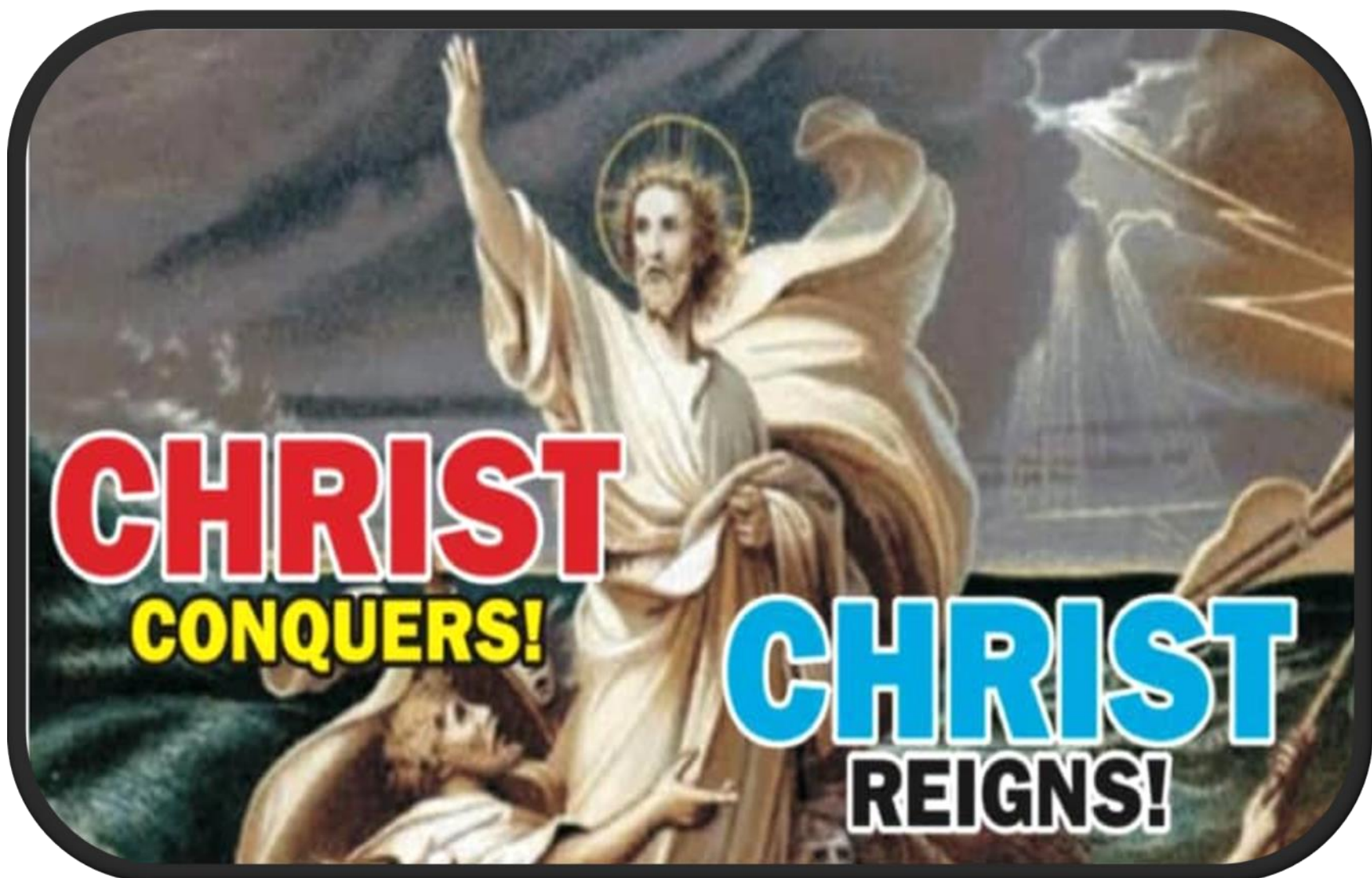
